GREENS MANAGER

Most of us have heard stories of how we came to have the particular type of Tiff grass in our greens. I had the good fortune recently to meet the man who brought it to Adelaide. He was the greenkeeper at Ascot Park when he went on an extended visit to the USA. In the course of his travels he visited a research institute in Florida and observed trial plots of various grasses.

At the time Tiff had already been introduced to Australia but he became interested in a version that he thought would be more suitable to Adelaide conditions. He obtained a small quantity which then travelled with him in his motor-home for the rest of his travels around the USA. He cared for it and brought it back to Adelaide and planted it in a two rink green at Ascot Park. (This green no longer exists)

Scarifyings from this were used to establish a lawn tennis court at a house not far from our club. In turn scarifyings from this court were brought to Hawthorn and introduced to our greens. So I guess when you hear people referring to our grass as "Ascot Tiff" that is a reasonable description.

Our greens have survived some extreme heat and are playing as well as most greens around. There was a lot of positive comment from bowlers during the Country Carnival.

We still intend to laser level a green as soon as pennants finish. A final decision as to which will be done has not yet been made but D Green is the probable one at this stage. We will, at the same time, also look at installing the plinths on the Eastern & Western sides of this green. There is a noticeable fall away on the Western side where we installed the root barrier.

Depending on the length of the break next Christmas another green will be levelled then.

The Advertiser April 9th 1862

It will be seen by an announcement in our advertising columns that the usual fortnightly meeting of the South Australian Debating Society will be held this evening at Aldridges Shades at 7.30pm. The subject for discussion is "Are Executions publically conducted more conducive to the Suppression of Crime than when privately performed?" Mr E. Ward will open the debate in the affirmative of the proposition and Mr E. Sabine will support the negative."

Adelaide's first hanging was from a tree but the founding fathers had not added a professional Jack Ketch to the 'must have' list when setting up the SA Company. The result was pretty awful with the crowd standing by for three tries, two by the hangman who then took off and the last by a few able bodied men in the crowd. Imagine going home to your tent in the sand hills and saying "Hi honey. I'm home" and the little woman saying "How was your day dear?" Nearly as bad, but not quite, as describing how others in your rink lost the match.

The Advertiser February 18th 1913

A movement was begun in Unley a few weeks ago in favour of setting apart reserves in the municipality for the benefit of the rising generation and of posterity. At a public meeting of citizens held subsequently it was unanimously resolved that steps should be taken to provide open spaces for recreational purposes and children's playgrounds and a committee was appointed to advance the movement.

Eat your heart out, Unley. Hawthorn already had not only a huge recreation area complete with an oval and tennis courts but a fantastic bowling club WITH LIGHTS. However, it was good to see civic minded folk in Unley but clearly they lacked the dynamic leadership of the Hawthornites. What they <u>did</u> get right was the footy club who over the years would generously give other clubs the thrill of premierships and not rudely hog it like some.
